Medicaid is a critical - and consistently popular - health insurance program that plays a significant role in local and state economies by keeping rural hospitals open, supporting job growth, and ultimately saving taxpayer dollars.

Medicaid and Our State Budget

In addition to providing lifechanging – and lifesaving – health coverage for millions, Medicaid also contributes to growing and thriving state economies. Medicaid funds help keep hospital doors open in our rural communities. Rural hospitals in states that have expanded Medicaid are 84% less likely to close than in non-expansion states. This is critical to ensuring rural communities have access to lifesaving care and good-paying jobs.

Medicaid is a good deal for states. Federal funds for Medicaid expansion states have added hundreds of thousands of new jobs to state economies, all while making their communities healthier and more prosperous. Medicaid also strengthens small businesses by giving employees access to affordable coverage, relieving the burden of high health care costs on new and small business owners. This also prevents low-wage workers from having to leave their jobs due to illness or injury because they don't have access to affordable health insurance.
